
- 1) Meeting was called to order by Alan Ong 9:01 PM.

- 3) David Wong shared information about balance in the budget and reviewed. Council approved budget unanimously.


- 4) Alan Ong shared information about CEC25 meeting regarding SHSAT and expected the same situation for our January meeting. He also attended PS 173 celebration.

Overcrowding and Transportable Classroom Units: Schools where enrollment exceeds capacity or TULs are required to accommodate students must be addressed in order to improve learning conditions for students. This may include identifying opportunities to increase capacity or althing enrollment from overcrowded schools to those with available reats.



School Scale and Sustainability:
A number of schools across the city struggle with low enrollment, which creates budgetary and programmatic challenges. Supports or structural changes at these schools, such as mergers, aim to provide students with a more



## **Kindergarten Capacity and Projected Enrollment**



# Overcrowding and Transportable Classroom Units

- District Need:
   Additional Elementary Capacity:
  - Overcrowding at the elementary school level is persistent throughout the district; it is mainly concentrated in the neighborhoods of Fresh Meadows, Bayside, and Oakland Gardens.
  - articens.

    Of the 20 elementary schools in the district, 17 operated with a utilization rate at or above 100% in the 2017-2018 school year.

    In the 2018-2019 school year, P.S./I.S. 178 has a zoned Kindergarten waitlist.
- The Superintendent, the Office of District Planning, and the Office of Student Enrollment will continue to work with principals to closely monitor enrollment trends and zone sizes at schools in District 26.



#### **Under-Utilized Buildings**

Each year, the NYCDOE publishes a list of under-utilized buildings. Inclusion on this list recognizes that a building potentially has excess space for the 2018-2019 school year that can be utilized more efficiently, but does not imply the NYCDOE will necessarily propose a change in building utilization. Any proposed changes would be preceded by an analysis of available space, as well as extensive community engagement.
