- 2. Minutes January 30, 2014 minutes reviewed. Motion to accept the January 30th minutes was made by Jaya Patil and seconded by Jaime Alvarez-Isasi. Council voted unanimously to approve minutes.
- 3. President's Report
 - a. Jeannette spoke with Monica Gutierrez-Director of Education in the Queens Borough President's office use to be the SCA rep for the CDEC who wanted issues and concerns the CDEC had regarding schools and education in their district. Jeannette updated her on what is important in the district. Updated her on the G&T issues, co-location at Martin Van Buren, safety in the streets and congestion of cars and buses. Will start listing defects in all schools, something like a punch list and someone go through it and repairs will have to be made. Jeannette would like to put together 10 top items or issues and present to Monica. Asking the council to think about it and send issues to her.
 - b. Spoke to Paola DeKock at FACE in which they discussed Martin Van Buren & it's rollout of the proposal and the effects it has on middle schools and the choices for the students. Viola stated it will have a meeting with the community regarding this colocation as to what the community is looking for.

Admissions have been reduced and the actual rollout has not been introduced.

Meeting called so that the minutes could be approved for the renaming of PS 115.

Marian asked the council to let her know who will be attending the UFT Scholarship Dinner because the budget has to be finalized March 7th. Money not being used will be transferred to the P-card. Scholarship dinner is May 22nd.

4. Budget – budget reviewed by council – Jeannette outlined that council is restricted as to what we can buy. CDEC funds the District Family Advocate workshops with food. CDEC supply water cooler & water. Meetings are expensed when outside of regular meeting location.

Also the legislative breakfast is March 7th and council needs to notify Kim D'Angelo. CDEC brought the tote bags for the bullying & cyberbullying workshop.

Jeannette stated that there used to be meetings at the Queens Borough President office with all the CEC's and the presidents would outline their concerns in their district.

Meeting called to discuss the G&T program.

Jeannette stated that the community received the good news about the G&T program and everyone is happy. Memo sent out (see below).

February 2014

Dear District 26 Community:

The Office of Student Enrollment and the Superintendent in consultation with the District 26 CEC have been working to create an inclusive and equitable process for admission to the middle school Gifted and Talented (G&T) programs in District 26. Historically, students in elementary school G&T programs have automatically articulated to middle school G&T programs at 26Q158, 26Q074, and 26Q067. This automatic articulation did not allow students outside of the programs to access the middle school G&T programs, nor did it allow for students in the program to choose which school they may prefer to attend for middle school.

It was previously announced that beginning with September 2014, all families would submit an application for the middle school G&T programs; students would be matched to one of the programs based on their scores on the 4th grade New York State (NYS) ELA and Mathematics tests. The historical articulation patterns would no longer exist.

However, after hearing community feedback on the proposed changes, we realized that families felt as though they did not have enough warning about the change. The consistent message that we received from the District 26 G&T community is that families matriculated in kindergarten with the clear understanding that they would remain in the G&T programs through 8th grade. Because of this understanding, we will not fully implement these changes until the incoming kindergarten class for September 2014 reaches middle school in September 2020. This means that all students currently in the elementary G&T programs in kindergarten through fifth grade will have a priority for admission to the middle school G&T program that was their historical articulation pattern. The specific articulation patterns are below.

^{*}For 2014-15 only, students at 26Q115 will articulate to 26Q067.

We will still offer the new G&T programs at 26Q172 and 26Q216 going forward and all students interested in middle school G&T programs, *including the students in the elementary G&T programs*, should complete an application to indicate their preferences for the G&T program. Specifics on the application process and the priority structure are outlined in more detail on the following page.

- All District 26 students may apply to any of the G&T programs that interest them.
- Each middle school will have two G&T sections unless a school risks exceeding its capacity to serve all of its zoned students. Any school requiring a capping plan due to over-enrollment will either reduce the number of G&T seats or eliminate the program the following year until the full zone can be served.
- Students in the elementary school G&T programs will have priority **only** to the specific school to which they would have historically articulated (see the articulation patterns above).
- Students in the elementary G&T program retain their priority to the program to which they
 would historically articulate as long as they rank it anywhere on their application. They do not,
 however, need to rank it first. All students must apply; students who do not submit an
 application will no longer maintain their priority to any program.
- Students in the elementary G&T program may also apply to other G&T programs, but they will
 not have the priority and will be placed in available seats based on their test scores along with
 their peers in the district.

Beginning with students applying for sixth grade admission for September 2020, students applying to middle school will no longer have any priority for any middle school G&T program. All students will be placed in descending score order at each of the middle schools with G&T programs regardless of where they attended elementary school. As with all policies related to admissions, this policy is subject to the Chancellor's approval and may be reviewed as a part of efforts to improve admissions policies districtor city-wide.

District 26 Middle School Application FAQ

How do I fill out the middle school application?

Families complete the middle school application by ranking programs to which they are interested in having their child attend *in order of preference*. If Program A is the program you would most like your child to attend then please rank it first on the application. Continue ranking in descending order all of the other programs for which you would like to be considered.

What does priority mean?

Priority means that you have a spot in a program before other students. If you don't get into a program you rank higher on the application then you will automatically be placed in the program to which you have a priority.

I have a priority to a particular program. Do I need to rank it first?

No, you may rank the program to which you have a priority anywhere on the application. However, if it is your first choice then you absolutely should rank it first.

If I am in an elementary school G&T program do I have priority to all of the middle school G&T programs?

No. You have priority only to the program to which students in your elementary school historically articulated for middle school. If you are interested in attending another program, you will be considered for that program based on your test scores.

What happens if I don't rank my priority program anywhere on the application?

You will not be considered for placement into that program and there will not be a space available for you in the fall. If you are interested at all in the program to which you have a priority, you must rank it somewhere on the application.

What happens if I rank a program higher than my priority program?

You will be considered for programs in the order in which you rank them. If you meet the criteria for your first choice then you will be matched to your first choice. If not, you will be considered for your second choice and so on until we reach the program to which you have a priority. At that point, you would then receive a match to your priority program.

If I rank my priority program on the application, do I get to choose between that program and other programs I ranked?

No. You will receive one match to the highest choice possible on the application. If you meet the criteria for your first choice, then you will receive your first choice regardless of priority.

I really only want to go to my priority program, but I ranked it third. Will I automatically get in? Not necessarily. If you meet the criteria for a program you ranked above your priority program on the application, you may receive a spot at the program you ranked higher. The middle school application process seeks to match students to the choice you tell us you prefer most by ranking. The program you most want to attend should be your first choice.

I think I filled out my application incorrectly. What can I do?

Please contact your elementary school for a new application. You may resubmit your application until March 7_{th} . After March 7_{th} , we will no longer be able to accept late applications.

I'm not in the G&T program, but I still think I filled out my application incorrectly. What can I do? Please contact your elementary school for a new application. You may resubmit your application until March 7th. After March 7th, we will no longer be able to accept late applications.

I'm happy with my application as I submitted it. Do I have to resubmit it?

No. Your application has already been processed and there is no need to resubmit.

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ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION TO MIDDLE SCHOOL

- Students are eligible to apply to the district middle schools in their district of public elementary school attendance and, when different, the district to which they are zoned to attend middle school.
- Additionally, there may be schools on your application which are located in a different district but to which students from a number of districts (including yours) may apply. Note that the application lists the district in which each school is located.
- If a school is not listed on your application, this means that you are not eligible to apply OR that the school runs its own admissions
 process. Do not write-in schools write-ins will not be considered.

Talent Testing for Mark Twain for the Gifted and Talented and District 21 Talent programs:

- Citywide applicants who submitted a Mark Twain/District 21 Request for Testing form will see Mark Twain for the Gifted and Talented (I.S. 239) with both talents listed on their personalized Middle School Applications.
- District 21 students who submitted a Mark Twain/District 21 Request for Testing form will see all District 21 talent programs for which
 they have requested to be tested on their personalized Middle School Applications.

Academically Enriched Programs in District 24

Eligible students in District 24 who submitted an OLSAT Request for Testing form (for Academically Enriched programs in this district)
 will see those programs on their personalized Middle School Applications.

If you submitted a Request for Testing Form but do not see the program choices for which you submitted a Request for Testing form, please notify your current school.

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Parents who wish to <u>appeal</u> must get new applications and submit by March 7th. No sibling priority in middle schools.

Applications for kindergarten are being accepted in September – no priority & no articulating.

A parent expressed gratitude to the DOE & the CDEC on behalf of District 26 families to secure a victory in their fight for a fair and equitable Middle School Gifted & Talented admission policy. She stated that it's this investment of time, of effort and of financial resources that was threatened and disregarded by the abrupt policy changes created by the Department of Education in a misguided effort to open admissions opportunities.

It's also because of this investment that we cannot be happier with the recent announcement by the DOE agreeing to grandfather our children, as well as create additional G&T seats in District 26 – as requested in our petition. This arrangement satisfies promises made to current G&T families under the previous policy and providing real opportunities to students not currently in the program.

By taking the time to personally understand our issue, and then taking the steps in seeking action from the DOE, your efforts were critical in this victory for all families and students in District 26.

When District 26 families looked to our school district leaders to serve as our voice, you answered the call and delivered – thank you! We look forward to working with you again in the years ahead for the betterment of our community.

The DOE's new administration has reinforced the importance of the strength in community.

We are humbled to have met with so many that have dedicated their free time to serve our community, our children, and to be the voice for those that can't.
